## Painted Lace Cuff

### Supplies:

Timtex  
Mistifuse - fusible web  
Painted Lace surface  
Ultrasuede

Once you see how fast and easy these cuffs are to make you'll want to make a different one for each day of the week!

To make the cuffs in these directions I'm using a painted lace surface. Check the Painted Lace Surfaces free project sheet for directions on how to create these surfaces. If you'd rather not create a painted lace surface you could just fuse a layer of fabric to a piece of Timtex and use that as the base for your cuff.

Cut your Timtex surface to a size you're comfortable wearing around your wrist. I've cut mine 2" x 7". The length of your cuff should be long enough so that it wraps around your wrist but doesn't overlap.

Cut a piece of ultrasuede or some other soft fabric for the underside (lining) that measures the same as the piece you cut for your cuff. Set this piece aside for now.

You can embellish your cuff surface with beads, buttons, charms or whatever you like.

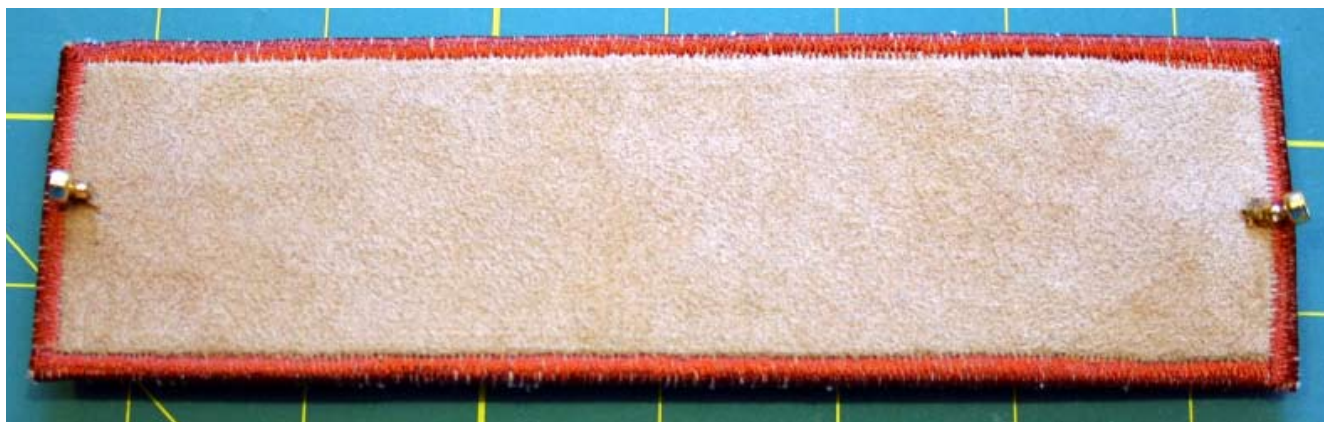


Keep your embellishments ½" or so in from each edge.

Fuse your lining fabric to the other side of your cuff and then use a satin or zigzag stitch to finish off the edges of your cuff.



I've used a magnetic closure on my cuff. This makes the cuff very easy to put on and take off. Sew one end of each piece of the closure to each end of the cuff.



TIP: If your cuff is a little too stiff to curve nicely, give it a few blasts of steam to soften the Timtex and then curve it around a cardboard or plastic tube to set the curve.
